# When in Religious Life: Bloom Where Planted

"God puts you where God needs you." That's what I say to myself when my phone rings at 2 a.m. because a Resident has fallen and needs to go to the emergency room. Greeting the EMT's who arrive and giving a synopsis of the Resident's health as they move through the lobby is just one of the unseen but important parts of my ministry. And ministry it is. Looking after the most vulnerable, seeing that their needs are met, is not something I dreamed of when I was younger. In fact, I had no plans other than becoming a Sister. Fortunately, God knew what God wanted, and guided me through 20+ years teaching (mostly French) in three schools in two states, then into School Administration – again three schools, two states.

When my last principal decided my position was no longer needed, I transitioned into administration in the Community as Building Administrator at the Motherhouse. There I recognized an approaching need for a Personal Care Home Administrator at Maria Hall, and took the State-required 100-hour training for certification. Eventually I moved to Maria Hall as Building Administrator and then Personal Care Home Administrator, ministering to my Sisters and to Sisters from two other Communities. As Administrator of a State-licensed facility, I oversee adherence to regulations, including ongoing training for staff and me, and many aspects of Resident life. My years working with young people taught me to be patient (most of the time), aware of what's going on, and to keep moving my buttons (in order to keep my cool), particularly when a Resident does not like a regulation.

Even though most of the Sisters are older than I, they need what I can help give them: food, shelter, a safe place, help with activities we take for granted, relief from pain. Didn't Jesus tell us to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, visit the imprisoned? I've learned that prison can be a weakening body, or one in pain, or one just lacking energy. Yes, administration is a ministry.

Because the Residents have come from responsible positions, some having been in charge here at Maria Hall, it can be difficult for them to admit they need help. One evening I was summoned to a Resident who had fallen and hit her head. She was conscious, but did not want to go to the emergency room (our protocol: a head injury requires a hospital visit). When I arrived at her room and told her that she needed to go to the hospital, she grudgingly acquiesced – because the Administrator told her so. With her in the emergency room, waiting for test results, I pulled out my phone to notify her responsible party. Looking at her face, now turning rainbow colors from the fall, I took a photo and sent it, with the caption "in the e.r." A picture is worth 1,000 words. Fortunately, it was only a bump with no other injuries, and she returned home. Administration is a ministry.

No story would be complete without some mention of COVID and its effect on the Residents. Isolation, limited movement, no access to the Eucharist – these were the most unsettling restrictions. However, among the blessings was my increased awareness of the Residents' feelings, demonstrated by the Prayer Service I composed, in which each of the quarantined Residents was mentioned by name followed by the refrain "we think of you and pray for you." Even more memorable was the encounter when I took Communion to a Resident who was limited to her room but not ill, who said, "Welcome, Jesus, and bless the one who brought you."

That is what I do here at Maria Hall – bring Jesus to all I meet. At the same time, I see Him in their faces, hear Him in their voices, and recognize Him in their pain. God has put all of us where God needs us.

## Blessed Be Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Altar

In this year in which the Church is focusing on the incredible gift of the Eucharist, the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius chose Sunday, April 14, to welcome people to the Villa grounds for Eucharistic Adoration and a minipilgrimage. Beginning at Maria Hall, the service included silent adoration, Scripture readings and the recitation of the rosary's Eucharistic mysteries to process from chapel to Basilica by way of three outdoor shrines: the Pieta, Assumption Court and the image of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. The beautiful day made the pilgrimage a joy, as did the realization of the profound mystery that drew us all together.

#### Leadership Meetings in Texas

#### For the Healing of Uvalde TX

On Friday, March 8, the SSCM Leadership Team had the opportunity to spend the day in Uvalde, Texas. A friend of Sister Susan Pontz, Father Matthew DeLeon, pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Uvalde, invited the Leadership Team to spend a day in this small town of 16,000 people that endured a massive school shooting on May 24, 2022, when a very troubled 28-year-old shot and killed nineteen fourth graders and two teachers in the local public school.

Father Matthew took the Leadership Team to lunch at Sacred Heart School where they met with the teachers and students and were treated to a rousing rendition of the school song and their motto, "All for Jesus." Following lunch, Father Matthew led the Sisters to the now-closed school where they prayed, and to the memorials and murals of the victims on the sides of Uvalde's downtown buildings.

Then, there were visits to the St. Henry Family Project site, and meetings with a school counselor and the head of the Uvalde Chamber of Commerce. After helping to lead the parish Stations of the Cross, the Sisters were invited to the Knights of Columbus Lenten fish dinner. The Sisters left Uvalde with a feeling of sadness, but with a realization that this was a town that had suffered greatly, but whose people are holding on to their faith with great strength and courage. Indeed, they were "All for Jesus!"

#### Religious Woman of the Year

Born: November 24, 1930 Professed: August 9, 1951 Went Home to God: March 30, 2024 Sister M. Jacqueline Ziobro, SS.C.M., died at Emmanuel Hospice on Holy Saturday. She was born in Dupont, PA, to Mary Stupak and Edward Ziobro. Dolores Rose Ziobro had 3 siblings, Mary, Edward and Gloria. She attended St. John the Baptist School in Pittston where the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius taught.

After graduating from Pittston High School in June 1948, she entered the SSCM's on September 8, and was professed on August 9, 1951. Her first recollection of wanting to be a Sister came in the second grade. She recalled holding on to her teacher's Rosary beads during recess. By the time she was in eighth grade she participated in the choir and accompanied her teacher to religious education classes in Laflin, PA, where she assisted the teacher by listening to the children as they recited their prayers.

Sister Jacqueline received her Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Education from Marywood University in Scranton, PA. Sister taught kindergarten through eighth grade, and also served as a Math and Reading Tutor and Librarian. Her teaching took her to Illinois, New Jersey, New York, Indiana, Pennsylvania and South Carolina. Her greatest joy was preparing students for the reception of the Sacraments of Penance, Holy Eucharist and Confirmation. As part of her ministry, Sister Jacqueline also guided the altar servers, lectors and school patrols. She treasured her years in Chicago and Bluffton SC.

Sister Jacqueline was grateful for the mentors and models the Lord provided for her in her formative years. Sister Jacqueline attributed her daily reliance on prayer to her family and Community members. She is especially grateful to her mother for teaching her devotion to the Blessed Mother. Sister also learned to recognize crosses as blessings and often said that spending time in prayer enabled her to draw the strength that she needed. Sister Jacqueline's life was a testimony to being grateful for all God's gifts, and her Community is grateful for the gift Sister Jacqueline was to us.
