Installation of 2021-2025 Leadership Team

Called to Serve in Leadership

Every four years, the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius meet to set direction for the future and elect leaders to move the Congregation into the next four years. One major exception to this pattern occurred last summer when the General Chapter was postponed because of the Coronavirus pandemic. With no opportunity to meet in person, the Leadership Team for 2016-2020 took on an additional year.

Fortunately, the blessing of relaxed protocols and the vaccination made gathering for a General Chapter possible this summer. Together from June 27th to July 2, the delegates met to set a direction for the community, "RootedinLove, Bearing Fruit." Onceset, the delegates elected a new team to lead us for four years. Given time to adjust to their new call, the team members were installed on Saturday, August 14, 2021.

The Leadership Team of the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius for 2021-2025 was installed at a liturgy celebrated by Father Alfred Sceski, pastor of St. Joan of Arc Church, Hershey, PA, and Associate of the SS.C.M.'s. The newly installed General Superior is Sister Barbara Sable who has as her Assistant Sister Michael Ann Orlik. Also elected to Leadership are Sister Carol Ann Terlicher, Sister Susan Pontz and Sister Pamela Smith.

As General Superior, Sister Barbara will serve the Sisters and the many ministries in which the Sisters are engaged in parishes, programs and schools in PA, NY, SC, IN, IL and TX. Her emphasis will be on encouraging the Sisters as well as the congregation's Associates and volunteers to live out the words of the SS.C.M. Constitutions: "Unitedinheartand motivated by sincere gratitude to God, we hope to meet the

needs of the Church with courage by proclaiming the Gospelmessage of Christ in the spirit of our own times."

Sister Barbara Sable is a native of Gary, IN, were she attended St. Mark's Grade School and graduated from Andrean High School, Class of 1967. She entered the Sisters of Saints Cyril and



Methodius in 1969 and was professed in 1972. Sister Barbara was engaged in the ministry of education in CT, NY, PA and SC where she served as teacher and guidance counselor. Later, Sister Barbara became a social worker and ministered as Program Director at Catholic Charities in Gary, IN. Sister spent ten years directing

food programs, rental and utility assistance programs, housing education, housing for chronically homeless individuals with severe mental illness, refugee resettlement and coordinating volunteer services. For the last nine years, Sister served as Assistant to the General Superior.

Having previously served as General Superior for nine years, Sister Michael Ann assumes the role of Assistant to Sister Barbara Sable. Sister Michael Ann is a native of Perth Amboy, NJ, and was a parishioner of Holy Trinity parish where she attended Holy Trinity School. Sister Michael Ann graduated from St. Cyril Academy, Danville, in 1966 and entered the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius on September 8 of that year. After profession in 1969, she taught Grades 5, 7 and 8 in four elementary schools. Sister spent 30 years in Mechanicsburg as principal of St. Joseph School. The last 8 years of the 30 she was also on the Leadership Team as a Councilor.

Born and raised in Gary, IN, Sister Carol Ann's inspiration to embrace religious life stemmed from her meeting the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius at Andrean High School, Merrillville, IN. After graduating in 1972 and attending the University of Evansville in southern Indiana for one year, she entered the community. The classroom was the mission field for most of Sister Carol Ann's religious life. She served as a theology teacher at Andrean for twenty years where she introduced Freshmen to the beauty and relevance of the Hebrew Scriptures. In December of 2017 and until 2020, Sister Carol Ann served as Director of Evangelization at two parishes in Endicott, NY, St. Anthony of Padua and St. Joseph.

Early in her religious life, Sister Susan Pontz taught on both the elementary and secondary levels. For two years Sister Susan taught at St. John the Baptist School, Pittston, PA and later at St. Cyril Academy for nine years. Sister then taught the teachers, staff and parishioners at St. Clare Montefalco Catholic Community, Grosse Pointe, MI, and began her studies toward an Ed. D. at Wayne State University in Detroit, MI. Sister also participated in a training program for Spiritual Directors at the Ignatius Jesuit Centre, Guelph, Ontario, Canada. Currently she is employed as Director of Instructional Technology at the Oblate School of Theology, San Antonio, TX, and continues her ministry of Spiritual Direction and Family Counseling. Early in her religious life, Sister Pamela Smith

was involved in the ministry of education on the secondary level at schools in Indiana and Pennsylvania. Later, Sister's Ph. D. in Systematic Theology sent her into the seminary classroom. Currently, Sister serves as Director of Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs for the Catholic Diocese of Charleston, SC. She is also an adjunct professor on the theological faculty of St. Leo University, the Charleston branch. Most recently, Sister Pamela wrote: A History of the Diocese of Charleston: State of Grace, for the bicentennial of the Diocese of Charleston. This book joins the fifteen books Sister Pamela has written on various aspects of spirituality.

Elected to community leadership, these Sisters bring a wealth of experience in ministry and professional expertise. We anticipate that they will move us gracefully into these next four years, "rooted in love and bearing fruit," for the glory of God and the coming of the Kingdom.

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from the General Superior

As we move through October, with thoughts of harvest and Thanksgiving, I find myself reflecting on the many things for which I have to be grateful. I'm not sureifitisinspiration or distraction, but bread is one of the first things that comes to my mind, probably because of the wonderful fragrance of fresh-baked bread that often comes from our Motherhouse bakery.

Bread does not just feed us, but fosters relationships. On both happy and sad occasions, food plays an important role. While shared family meals can no longer be taken for granted in today's society, there remains something special about eating with - breaking bread with - those we love. In the cultural world of Jesus, sharing food was both a social and a religious event. It would have been

unthinkable to "break bread" without first saying a blessing, acknowledging the Creator. The act of sharing bread was also a way of saying "We are at peace with one another;" as family, or as friends. To share a meal was a strong statement.

It is significant that after the Resurrection, Jesus is recognized "in the breaking of bread" by the two disciples he met on the road to Emmaus. Broken bread means bread shared, and a relationship is affirmed and fostered. Eucharist is the meal we continue to share with the Risen Lord. Jesus desires to be in relationship with us, and this breaking of bread is also an invitation to enter into relationship with one another in the family of God. If the Eucharist were to be realized in its fullness, it would turn us outward to make peace with others, to embrace all God's children. This is clearly the work of a lifetime yet sometimes we do get glimpses of what it means when we gather together, as Christians always have, to break the bread. "Their eyes were opened," Luke wrote of the two disciples at Emmaus, "and they recognized him."

May you recognize Christ in each other through all the bread we break and share.

Marguerite Dankulich was born in Pittston, PA, on July 1, 1932, the daughter of George and Mary (Staso) Dankulich. Marguerite was the second youngest of eight children. She attended public school in West Pittston then transferred to St. John the Baptist School in Pittston. After graduating from St. John the Baptist School, she attended West Pittston High School. After high school graduation Marguerite spent a year of study at St. John Business School in Pittston, PA.

Responding to the call of a religious vocation, Marguerite entered as a postulant in the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius in Danville, PA, on September 8, 1952. When she was received as a novice on August 13, 1953, she received the name Sister Vernice. On August 3, 1955, she made her first profession of vows and celebrated 65 years of profession in 2020.

Sister Marguerite Dankulich received a B. S. in Education from Marywood University, Scranton, and began her teaching career in parish elementary schools in Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania and South Carolina teaching in Grades 2, 3, 4, 6, 7 and 8. Then, with an M.A. in Spanish from Millersville University, *Hermana Marguerite* taught Spanish at Andrean High School, Merrillville, IN, and at Bishop O'Hara High School, Olyphant, PA. Sister Marguerite ended her teaching career teaching 4th graders in Mechanicsburg, PA, and Endicott, NY and substitute teaching in Harrisburg and Wilkes-Barre, PA.

In 2013, Sister Marguerite retired from active ministry to Maria Hall in Danville where she engaged in the Ministry of Prayer and Hospitality. Looking back on her religious life for the celebration of her Jubilee, Sister Marguerite wrote: "I can see how many times over the years the Lord was always there with the graces I needed to do his holy will. Awareness of his loving presence with me at all times has given me the strength to do his holy will."

Sister Marguerite Dankulich is survived by her sister, Ann Dankulich in Honolulu, HI, and several nieces and nephews in Hawaii, New York and New Jersey.

A private Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated at Maria Hall in Danville on Thursday, September 9, 2021. Interment was at the Sisters' cemetery immediately following the Mass.
