Jankola Library and Slovak Museum Treasures in Good Hands

"God will provide" is no insignificant saying for the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius. Over the one hundred and sixteen years of our community mission, God has faithfully provided us with direction, protection and assistance. Most recently, the Jankola Library and Slovak Museum has been a focus of attention.


Since 1968, our Jankola Library and Slovak Museum has been an important depository of Slovak literature, culture and the arts in the United States. Bearing the name of our founder, Father Matthew Jankola, the library and its succession of Sister Directors have fostered scholarship and multiculturalism in the materials that have been donated to the library. Over 20,000 books, Slovak periodicals, newspapers and maps along with Slovak art and crafts

were available to scholars and students of Slovak culture and history. But, over the years, visits to the Jankola Library have decreased. One reason is that there is currently greater interest in genealogical data than in Slovak history. Families whose members emigrated to the United States are interested in knowing the history of their immigrant relatives and what contributions they have made to their adopted land. These stories are contained in the collections of Slovak periodicals and newspapers that were stored but not readily available in our library.

As our community anticipates the future disposition of our Motherhouse property, we realize our responsibility to care for the treasures that have been entrusted to us in the Jankola Library. God has provided us with the best possible collaborator! The National Czech and Slovak Museum and Library (NCSML) in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, is a subsidiary of the Smithsonian Museum and is willing and delighted to receive the contents of our library and museum. Their mission is to engage the global community with unique Czech, Slovak and American stories to inspire individuals with universal themes of culture, freedom, democracy and immigration. Our search for a collaborator led us to the NCSML whose commitment to

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those who emigrated to America and contributed their hard work, skill and vision to the growth of this nation mirrors our own. Their ability to digitize our collections will assure that these materials will be respectfully kept and widely used to honor the history of Slovak immigrants and their contributions.

The step-by-step transfer of boxed periodicals, newspapers and books began December 4-8, 2023, when Vice President and Chief Operating Officer Dr. Dalibor Mikulas and Library Director David Muhlena made their first of three trips to Danville with a mid-sized rental truck. In advance of their visit, Stephen Baluch had begun packing the materials, happy to help us contribute to the NCSML.

In May of 2024, Sisters Barbara Sable, Michael Ann, Carol Ann and Jeanne Ambre went to Cedar Rapids for the opening of the Furdek Special Collection at the NCSML. As part of their 50th Anniversary celebration, our contribution to their library was unveiled and recognized. It was gratifying to see how grateful the officials and members of the NCSML are to the SS.C.M.'s.

A second visit in August of 2024 filled another mid-size truck. And then, in November of 2024, Dr. Dalibor Mikulas and David Muhlena visited Danville a third time with Stefanie Kohn, Curator of the Museum in Cedar Rapids. For this visit, they rented a semi in anticipation of the transfer of additional boxed periodicals, newspapers, books and items for display in the museum. The truck was loaded with two rented forklifts which were used by all three of our guests to fill the truck!

An additional tie between the NCSML and the SS.C.M.'s was revealed and rung at a ceremony in Iowa. The Cedar Rapids Orloj, the first astronomical Clock Tower in the United States, was dedicated on September 27, 2024. One of the twelve wooden sculptures that circulate to music following the ringing of the clock is a figure fashioned after a photograph of Mother Pius as a novice. She represents all religious who ministered in education to Czech and Slovak immigrants. What a "moving" testimony!









Sister Gloria Marie Kascak, SS.C.M. (Lorraine Kascak) died at Emmanuel Sunset Hospice in Danville on December 5, 2024. She was born in Bridgeport, CT, on July 17, 1934, the only child of Mary Galya and Golly Kascak. She attended Holy Name of Jesus primary school in Stratford, CT, where the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius taught, and Saint Cyril Academy in Danville.

After graduating from Saint Cyril Academy in 1952, she entered the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius on February 2, 1953, made her first

Sister Irene Rose Kmetz, SS.C.M., died Tuesday, December 24, 2024, at Emmanuel Center in Danville. She was born in Gary, IN, on March 13, 1934, the daughter of John and Elizabeth (Hreha) Kmetz. Sister Irene Rose grew up in a large, close family of 7, her Mother and Father and 5 children. Sister often said that one great joy as a Sister included the wonderful family of Sisters in Community with whom she lived each year. She knew well what joys come from being in a large family.

She attended Holy Trinity School in Gary and graduated in 1951 from St. Cyril Academy in Danville, PA. She entered the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius on September 8, 1951, was received as a novice on August 13, 1952, and professed vows on August 9, 1954. Sister Irene Rose received a Bachelor of Arts degree in education from Marywood University in Scranton and a Master's in Reading from Cardinal Stritch College in Milwaukee, WI.

When she celebrated her 65th anniversary as a Religious in 2019, Sister said, "I always knew I wanted to be a teacher, and as a student in Danville, I asked myself, 'Why not be a Sister and teach for Christ?' I entered the SS.C.M.community right after high school and here I am, 65 years later, doing the Lord's work to spread His Kingdom." Sister Irene Rose served in education for many years as both Teacher and Principal

profession of vows on August 3, 1955, and her final profession of vows in 1960.

Sister Gloria Marie received her B.A. in Education from Marywood University. Sister's 57-year career in education brought her to several places, serving as teacher and/or principal in Perth Amboy NJ; Plymouth, Hazleton, and Jessup, PA; and Stratford CT. She also served as parish minister at Holy Name of Jesus Parish in Stratford, CT, and served in the Diocesan Office of Education in Bridgeport, CT.

Sister Gloria Marie returned to Danville in 2017, where she then served as sacristan at Emmanuel Skilled Care and Rehabilitation Center in Danville, and also as an aide at Saint Cyril Preschool and Kindergarten where she provided after-school care.

When celebrating her 50th anniversary as a Religious Sister, Sister Gloria Marie wrote, "The joys I have experienced and taken delight in as a consecrated religious have been varied and many. Whether teaching, studying, administering or spending time with the Lord in prayer, inner joy was always present in my life. God has helped me to trust him that all will be well. We are all safe in his presence and we can lean on him because he provides a safe place for us to rest at all times."

Sister Gloria Marie was well-known for her beautiful smile and kind disposition--she is greatly missed by all of her Sisters-in-Christ.

Sister also had a great love for serving the elderly and did so for nearly 25 years at Villa Saint Cyril and St. Benedict Home, both in Illinois. In this capacity she served in many roles, including Transportation Coordinator, Volunteer Coordinator, and patient escort. When Sister Irene Rose was missioned to Maria Hall in Danville, PA, she served in various capacities, most notably as coordinator of the Religious Articles Shop, which she managed with her sister, Sister Rosanne.

Sister Margaret Dubas, SS.C.M., formerly known as Sister Kenneth Marie, died at Emmanuel Hospice Center, Danville, on March 8, 2025. Born in Baltimore, MD, on September 25, 1942, she was the daughter of John and Jean (Hemmock) Dubas. She attended St. Michael Elementary School, in Jessup, PA, and graduated from St. Patrick High School in Olyphant, PA. She entered the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius, Danville, on September 8, 1960, and professed her final vows on August 15, 1968.

Sister Margaret Dubas received a B.A. in education from Cabrini College, an M.S. in Secondary School Science from Villanova University, and an RN from Geisinger Medical Center School of Nursing. Sister served in the ministry of education for most of her Religious Life, as a Science and Math teacher at Lebanon High School in Lebanon, PA, at Villa Sacred Heart Teacher Training Institute and at Saint Cyril Academy in Danville, PA. Sister also served as an instructional aide at St. Cyril Preschool and Kindergarten, and served as a Councilor on the Congregational Leadership Team.

During her years at Saint Cyril Academy, in addition to her teaching duties, Sister served as Class Moderator and Activities Director, and she began a Bowling Club, a Hiking Club in connection with the International Volksmarch Association, and a Medical Explorers Troop in conjunction with Geisinger Medical Center. Sister Margaret Dubas inspired many students to consider careers in science, and served as a mentor for many as they successfully went on to become

doctors, nurses, veterinarians and teachers.


