A Celebration of Final Profession

United with and in Christ and with One Another

In a recent audience for the Jubilee of Consecrated Life, Pope Leo XIV told the assembled religious: "With your vitality and the witness of a life where Christ is the center and the Lord, you can help to 'wake up the world.'" The story leading to Sister Mary Kate Mensch's final profession tells of what the Holy Father calls: "a luminous trail in the great plan of peace and salvation that God has for humanity."

As a very young Catholic, I cannot remember ever seriously considering that God might be calling me to religious life. I attended Queen of Peace elementary school in Shamokin and Our Lady of Lourdes for high school. Throughout those years, the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (IHM) from Philadelphia were our teachers and I remember the Catholic values they instilled in us--and I especially remember enjoying the times we would pray the rosary in class during the month of May.

During my high school years at Lourdes, a few of the teachers and staff sensed that I had a vocation even before I did. One of the Sisters, I believe, had prayed for my vocation since she met me during my Sophomore year. Also, during this time, the chaplain at Lourdes (Fr. Charles Persing) commented during a school Mass at the beginning of the school year that he believed that there would be one Sister and one Priest in the assembly. Those two would be myself and Fr. Jon Sawicki, who was two years ahead of me at Lourdes.

At home, I cannot remember ever missing Sunday Mass. We were also involved with sports, especially basketball. I have always found it a blessing to have two faith traditions in our house--Mom's side of the family is Catholic and Dad's side is Methodist. I believe that is providential because our Sisters are very involved in Ecumenism and that was modeled for me as a youngster at home. I can vividly remember both of my grandmothers being active in their respective churches and each modeling a deep relationship with Christ. My paternal gram would read the Bible from cover to cover--reading sections every evening before falling asleep. My maternal gram always prayed the rosary and would frequently watch shows on EWTN. Without ever really saying it, faith was important to our family.

I did not actively start discerning religious life until my senior year of college at Bloomsburg University. Prior to attending Bloomsburg, I had attended Immaculata University in Malvern for two years before transferring to Bloomsburg to be closer to family (I was a bit homesick at the time). A friend from Immaculata, Tracey, had entered the IHM congregation in 2008 and it sparked something inside of me.

change. I noticed that I felt at home with our Sisters. Praying in our chapel, I asked God to help me discern where he wanted me, because I knew I would not be able to do this alone. (It would be another 7 years before I would officially enter the congregation.) In that time, I moved to Harrisburg and took a position at the Harrisburg Post offices and joined the choir at Saint Catherine Labouré parish where our Sisters had once served. It was there that I met two of our first Lay Associates--John and Joreen Kelly. They were a wonderful support at the time and I am honored to still have them involved in my life.

I could see the joy on her face. It was a deep joy that I felt I was missing. I then decided to contact the vocation director with the IHM Sisters just to see if this might be where God was calling me.

In the meantime, I graduated from Bloomsburg University in 2009 with a Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology and took a full-time position as a Shift Supervisor at Sheetz. I knew that I was longing for something more, so while in contact with the vocation director, I began to attend Mass more often and became more involved at Queen of the Most Holy Rosary in Elysburg. At a Sunday Mass as I was robing in the sacristy to be a Lector, Fr. Al Sceski, my Pastor, suggested I meet with the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius. At the time, I knew very little about our Sisters, and was hesitant to visit with them but I did. After meeting with the Sisters, I was sure (or at least I thought I was sure) that God was not calling me here, but I did want to make retreats here.

It was during this time, I believe, my heart began to

On July 17, 2016, I officially entered the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius as a candidate and began my journey of formation. I have spent time in San Antonio, TX; Bluffton, SC; and Wilkes-Barre, PA, as well as visited areas where our Sisters served in Stratford, CT; Chicago, IL; and Gary, IN. On September 14, 2019, I professed my first vows. Father Al Sceski was the celebrant of the Mass.

This September 6th, I celebrated my perpetual profession in the Congregation. Our Sisters, my family and friends, our Associates and many of Maria Joseph Continuing Care Community staff and residents joined in the celebration. I feel so fortunate and blessed to have all of these wonderful people in my life who have been role models, supporters, educators and Sisters. I know now that all along, it was God who was calling me here and who filled those moments when I was longing for "something more." God led me here and I am grateful to Him for each one of the blessings along the way.

Reconnecting with Those Who Came Before Us


A Visit to the Villa

On Thursday, September 4, the Sisters were visited by the great-grandson of John Grove who was one of the original residents of the Villa mansion. Michael Wolf arrived with several artifacts to show, a visual aide, and a walnut, marble-topped table to return as a gift.

Having done some research on the Grove family through the Danville Historical Society, Mr. Wolf knew Sis Hause, a Danville historian and an Alumna of St. Cyril Academy. She and a friend accompanied Mr. Wolf for the visit to the Villa.

Mr. Wolf was happy to present the Sisters with a large poster which depicts the Grove family tree as well as photographs of the mansion under construction and the iron furnace company that they owned.

The table which Mr. Wolf presented to the Sisters had been purchased at the 1876 Philadelphia Centennial Exposition and brought to Danville. Around 1896, it was moved to the Philadelphia area with family. Mr. Wolf thought it belonged in the house for which it was purchased.

During this Jubilee Year of Hope, the Basilica of Saints Cyril and Methodius, chosen as one of seven Diocesan Pilgrimage sites, has enjoyed being visited by pilgrims. If they have time to spare, they can do a self-guided tour provided in a booklet that tells it all, and even visit the outdoor shrines and sacred places itemized and explained in another booklet. The Motherhouse receptionist is happy to stamp the pilgrim's passport with a linear image of the Basilica's baldacchino, a feature the pilgrim will not soon forget.

If you've not visited and gotten your passport stamped, have no fear--the Jubilee Year doesn't end until January 6, 2026!

Direction and Leadership

As a community, the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius gather every summer to reconnect, and re-energize our mission and ministry. Every four years, this gathering is “Chapter,” a canonical event to set a direction for the future and elect a Leadership Team to guide us into that future. From June 29th through July 3rd, the Sisters engaged in the work of the 25th General Chapter as delegates, participant observers and prayerful participants.

Through the detailed reports of the General Superior and General Treasurer, a presentation on immigration by Joanne Castner, the welcoming of new SS.C.M. Associate Judge Anthony McDonald, special Masses and prayer services including a Prayer Outside the Walls, the Sisters spoke with each other, and our Associates, about the direction in which we want to minister for the next four years, and then gathered to call five Sisters to lead us on that journey.

On August 9, 2025, the newly-elected Leadership Team was installed at a joyful Liturgy in the Basilica celebrated by Father Patrick Devine. The work begins!

St. Helena Island, South Carolina **Improvements Abound**

Saint Francis must be proud of the ministry being done in his name in South Carolina! "Praised be to you, my Lord, ...especially Brother Sun." An impetus for action, the Sisters at the St. Francis Center saw a need that could be addressed with donations to purchase air conditioners for their neighbors. Operation Breathe Easy!
